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EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR REPORT



As we look back on 2025, I am pleased to share that the South Dakota public university system remains steady, future-focused, and committed to the value we bring to students and communities throughout the state. In a time of significant demographic and economic change in higher education nationwide, continued stability is a strong indicator of the system's strength and resilience.

This year, total system enrollment across our six public universities remained above 36,000 students, reflecting a holding pattern rather than a decline. This year's performance demonstrates that our strategy, focused on the student experience and academic quality, is holding firm even as the higher education marketplace grows more competitive. More South Dakota students choosing to pursue their education in-state reinforces our mission and affirms the work taking place on every campus.

Across the system, several initiatives advanced this year, reflecting our commitment to academic excellence and student success. Implementation of the Board's civics competency expectation continued through new coursework and programming across multiple campuses. This work emphasizes our belief that public universities must not only prepare students for their careers but also for their responsibilities as informed members of society.

The Board also advanced a system-wide post-tenure review policy, underscoring our dedication to faculty development and accountability. This policy is designed to ensure that tenured faculty continue to excel in teaching, research, and service throughout their careers. It respects the value of tenure while also reflecting the expectations of today's learning environment.

2025 was a year of transition at Northern State University. We thank Interim President Nichols for providing continuity and leadership during this period of change. As we move into 2026, we're excited to welcome back Dr. Alan LaFave. Dr. LaFave returns to his alma mater and longtime institution after seven years as President of Valley City State University (VCSU) in North Dakota. Prior to his presidency at VCSU, he spent nearly three decades at Northern State University, from Instructor to Professor of Music, Department Chair, Associate Dean, Dean of the School of Fine Arts, and Provost and Vice President for Academic Affairs. We look forward to working with Dr. LaFave to ensure a smooth transition and to support his vision for the university's future.

This Fall, we launched a student housing and meal-plan experience survey to better understand how residential life influences satisfaction, belonging, and retention. A true student voice must be central to our future decision-making, and the data gathered this year will guide improvements in procedures, facility planning, dining services, and the overall student experience.

Thank you for your commitment to our mission, for the work you do to support our students, and for your confidence in our public universities. I look forward to all we will accomplish together in the year ahead.

THE SOUTH DAKOTA BOARD OF REGENTS MEMBERS



Tim Rave, *President*

(Baltic, SD) Tim Rave is the president and CEO of the South Dakota Association of Healthcare Organizations. He served in both chambers of the South Dakota Legislature, first in the House of Representatives from 2003-11, where he became Speaker of the House, and later in the Senate from 2011-15, where he was the majority leader. Rave attended South Dakota State University and graduated from the University of Sioux Falls. Appointed by Governor Noem in 2021, his term will expire in 2027.



Jeff Partridge, *Vice President*

(Rapid City, SD) Jeff Partridge is the president of Partridge Financial Services. He served on the Rapid City Common Council from 2003-05, including a term as the council's vice president. Partridge was on the legislature's budget-setting Joint Appropriations Committee for six years, while serving terms in the House of Representatives from 2015-17 and in the Senate from 2017-21. He is a graduate of Augustana University. Appointed by Governor Noem in 2021, his term will expire in 2027.



Randy Frederick, *Secretary*

(Hayti, SD) Randy Frederick is an ag operator. He served for 12 years in the South Dakota State Legislature and was the Chairman of the Senate Appropriations Committee for six years. He was also a member of Governor Rounds' transition team and a Legislative Task Force Member. Appointed by Governor Noem in 2023, his term will expire in 2029.



Miles Beacom

(Sioux Falls, SD) Miles Beacom serves as Chief Executive Officer of PREMIER Bankcard, a role he has had since 1993. Beacom currently serves on the Board of Directors for PREMIER Bankcard, LLC, First PREMIER Bank, United National Corporation, and as the 2025 President of the Board of the Sioux Falls Chamber of Commerce. He also serves on the South Dakota Freedom Scholarship Board, the Sioux Empire United Way, Sanford Health International, the Dakota State University Foundation, the Catholic Diocese for Eastern South Dakota, and the USD Beacom School of Business Advisory Board. Miles is a graduate of Dakota State University. In 2009, the University of South Dakota dedicated the Beacom School of Business in his honor.



Judy Dittman

(Madison, SD) Dr. Judy Dittman began her career as a K-10 physical education teacher in the Newell Independent School District before becoming an instructor of health and physical education, as well as the head women's basketball and softball coach at Dakota State University. After 34 years of teaching at both the University of Iowa and Dakota State University, Dr. Dittman became the Dean of the College of Education at DSU. Since 2013, she served as the Provost and Vice President for Academic Affairs, a professor of physical education and exercise science, the assistant to the president of special programs, and the Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences at DSU. Dr. Dittman retired in 2020. Appointed by Governor Noem in 2023, her term will expire in 2029.



James Lochner

(Dakota Dunes, SD) Jim Lochner served as Chief Operations Officer of Tyson Foods from 2009 until he retired in 2014. Prior to that, he was given responsibility for Tyson's Fresh Meat Business in 2001. Lochner also served on executive committees with various trade organizations, including the American Meat Institute and National Cattlemen's Beef Association. He lives in Dakota Dunes and graduated from the University of Wisconsin-Madison with bachelor's and master's degrees in meat and animal science. Appointed by Governor Noem in 2023, his term will expire in 2027.



Griffin Petersen

(Onida, SD) Griffin Petersen is a student at the University of South Dakota studying political science and criminal justice, with a minor in history. He has served USD's student body as a Student Government Association Senator since his freshman year, he has also held leadership roles as President of the USD College Republicans and as President of his fraternity, Lambda Chi Alpha. Petersen recently served as an intern for both of South Dakota's U.S. Senators out in Washington, DC, and interned for the South Dakota State House of Representatives during the 98th Legislative Session.



Randy Rasmussen

(Vermilion, SD) Randy Rasmussen worked in the family business for many years and has had the pleasure of interacting with employees, students, and family members of the University of South Dakota community. Rasmussen graduated from the University of South Dakota with a bachelor's degree in accounting and from Grand Canyon University with a master's degree in business administration. He is currently the payroll supervisor for HoChunk, Inc. Appointed by Governor Noem in 2023, his term will expire in 2028.



Pam Roberts

(Pierre, SD) holds a bachelor's degree in commercial economics from South Dakota State University. She retired in 2013 after a career in senior leadership roles, including Secretary of Labor, Commissioner of Personnel, and Chief of Operations, in the administrations of governors Janklow, Mickelson, Miller, Rounds, and Daugaard. Roberts and her husband, Clay, operate their family's ranch in Stanley and Lyman counties. Appointed by Governor Daugaard in 2016, her term will expire in 2028.

SOUTH DAKOTA SCHOOL FOR THE BLIND AND VISUALLY IMPAIRED

The South Dakota School for the Blind and Visually Impaired is a K-12 accredited school by the South Dakota Department of Education that supports children with visual impairments to access educational resources to prepare them for life. Established over a century ago, the school has a long-proven commitment to developing and using the best instructional practices and accommodations to educate students (up to age 21) who are blind and visually impaired. Students, public schools, and families across the state rely on SDSBVI to introduce new technologies, share curriculum developments, and train others on relevant teaching methods.

SDSBVI outreach vision consultants serve children with vision loss, parents, and teachers across South Dakota. Consultants provide on-site technical assistance, educational material, and individualized educational planning to public schools and in the homes of families with young children.

SOUTH DAKOTA SERVICES FOR THE DEAF AND HARD OF HEARING

The South Dakota Services for the Deaf (SDSD) was established in 1880 and continues to provide educational and support services to students who are deaf and hard of hearing. SDSD’s mission is to be a partner in educational success for children from birth through high school graduation (or up to age 21). SDSD serves as a resource by providing informed, evidence-based consultation to families, schools, and educational teams statewide, including both screening and diagnostic audiology services, and multidisciplinary evaluations.

SDSD’s current focus is statewide outreach programs supporting students, parents, and educators in school and home environments. In 2009, SDSD shifted to an all-outreach program for students who are deaf and hard of hearing, expanding educational support services to public and private schools and daycares for South Dakota students, families, and educators. In addition to outreach, SDSD provides on-site clinical audiology services in Sioux Falls and Rapid City.


South Dakota's public university system continues its upward momentum in student enrollment. This marks the fourth consecutive year of targeted system growth and the second successive year with more than 36,000 students – a notable benchmark in the face of national challenges in higher education.

More encouraging, a greater number of **South Dakota high school graduates are choosing to pursue public higher education within the state** than in years past. The number of South Dakota students enrolled across the six public universities rose to 22,410, up more than 1,600 students since Fall 2021. This trend is a strong indicator of confidence in the state's public higher education system.

WHILE ANNUAL PERCENTAGE GROWTH WAS FLAT THIS YEAR COMPARED TO THE PREVIOUS 5% SURGE SEEN IN 2024, SYSTEM OFFICIALS NOTE THAT THE YEAR-OVER-YEAR STABILITY IS POSITIVE GIVEN THE ALREADY STRONG BASE OF LAST FALL'S ENROLLMENT.






STUDENT LOANS

Average Student Loan Balance by State (2025)

The South Dakota Board of Regents prioritizes student affordability and stresses the importance of accessible higher education. According to the Office of Federal Student Aid, South Dakota students hold the one of the lowest debt balances averages in the nation. The current average student debt balance in South Dakota is \$31,171, while the national average is \$39,075.

- Students who used their federal loans to attend public institutions nationwide owe an average of \$28,775.
- The average student who attended any private, nonprofit institution owes \$42,449.

Loan Default Rates

Traditionally, the Loan Default Rate showcases student employability. South Dakota students are able to make their way into the workforce and begin repaying any loans that accumulated while in school. As expected, FY 2022 cohort default rates were significantly impacted by the pause on federal student loan payments that began March 13, 2020. During the pause, borrowers with student loans held by the U.S. Department of Education (ED) were not required to make any payments, and no borrowers with ED-held loans entered default.

HIGH SCHOOL MATRICULATION

The chart illustrates high school graduates who enrolled in a postsecondary institution within 16 months of graduation. At the end of the 2023-24 academic year, South Dakota high schools graduated 9,528 students. Nearly 65% of these graduates chose to pursue further education, with almost half enrolling in a Board of Regents institution.

HIGH SCHOOL DUAL ENROLLMENT (HSDE)

The following charts show that many high school students are capable of university-level academic work. Completing university-level courses while still in high school is one of the multiple ways that allow students to earn their degrees sooner and thus reduce the cost of higher education. Dual enrollment is a program that enables high school students to take college-level courses at a public university that count for both high school and college credit. This South Dakota Board of Regents program is designed to give students a head start on their higher education journey and includes courses taken through High School Dual Credit, Concurrent Credit and Non-Degree Seeking Admission.



GRANT-FUNDED & FEATURED PROGRAMS

TEACHER APPRENTICESHIP PATHWAY (TAP) TO ADDRESS SOUTH DAKOTA'S TEACHER WORKFORCE SHORTAGE

The TAP is a “grow-your-own” program that allows paraprofessionals (teacher’s aides /educational assistants) currently employed in South Dakota public schools to train to become fully certified teachers while continuing to work in their current position. Participants earn a bachelor’s degree in elementary education, special education, or secondary education while receiving hands-on experience and financial support.

Eighty-nine students launched the pilot in Fall 2023 with funding from the SDDOE. Due to its strong early results, the Legislature approved \$800,000 in House Bill 1201 to support 90 additional students starting in Fall 2024. The program spans two years, with cohorts expected to graduate in Summer 2025 and Summer 2026.



LITERACY BLUEPRINT COURSES TO IMPROVE LITERACY OUTCOMES FOR YOUNG LEARNERS AND ADOLESCENTS ACROSS THE STATE

The SDDOE partnered with the state’s public universities to design comprehensive foundational literacy courses rooted in the Science of Reading. These “Literacy Blueprint” courses aim to equip SD educators with the crucial knowledge and skills needed for effective reading instruction. The design for these literacy courses took place in 2024-25, and courses were made available to educators in the 2025-26 school year.



MATH PATHWAYS ADVISING TOOLS TO REDUCE COLLEGE MATH FAILURE RATES BY HELPING STUDENTS CHOOSE MATH COURSES THAT SUPPORT COLLEGE SUCCESS, SCHOLARSHIPS, AND TIME AND COST SAVINGS.

These math advising tools found on OurDakotaDreams.com show middle and high school students how to align their math coursework options to career interests and relevant programs of study in college. By searching for occupations and the minimum college math course required for the related degree, students can choose strategic math courses that help them prepare for success in college, qualify for scholarships, and save time and money.

This advising tool aims to help students succeed in college math. Funded by the SD Education Access Foundation (SDEAF), the advising tools were developed with guidance from an expert group of middle and high school math teachers, university faculty, counselors, and students.



YEAR-LONG COLLEGE ALGEBRA PILOT TO SUPPORT COLLEGE-BOUND STUDENTS WHO NEED EXTRA HELP TO SUCCEED IN COLLEGE MATH

The pilot course, made possible by SDEAF, is offered under the umbrella of Our Dakota Dreams, via the Northern State University E-Learning Center and delivered to high school juniors and seniors. It is structured as a two-semester (year-long) program:

- First semester – “Math for College Readiness” lays the foundation and helps students strengthen their math readiness for college-level work.
- Second semester – Students take the dual-credit college course MATH 114 College Algebra, earning both high-school credit and 3 college credits.

Upon successful completion (earning at least a “C” or higher in the first semester), students secure placement in the spring dual-credit portion under the same teacher, which helps continuity and consistency.

This pilot was to trial a course model for successful preparation for college-level math. The grant funding this 3-year program expires at the end of the 2025-26 school year. With successful outcomes (growing enrollment and encouraging pass rates), the NSU E-Learning Center will sustain the program and add an English component starting in the 2026-27 school year.





ACADEMIC COMPLETION AND RETENTION

Student counts include new students who began a bachelor's degree program in the Fall 2019 term on a full-time basis. These students had not attended any other postsecondary institution since graduating from high school or earning a GED. Transfer, continuing, high school, and special students (non-degree seeking) were excluded. Those shown as enrolled in graduate or professional programs in Fall 2025 may have completed a bachelor's degree at another university.

TOTAL DEGREE MAJORS AWARDED | ACADEMIC YEAR 2025

Each of the six BOR Institutions offers degrees specific to their missions. Black Hills State University and Northern State University are Regional Comprehensive Universities that deliver access to their region and provide mechanisms for students to achieve associate, bachelor, and occasional master's programs. Dakota State University and South Dakota School of Mines and Technology are Special Focus Universities offering specific degrees in engineering and computer sciences with limited other fields of study. South Dakota State University and the University of South Dakota are Research Universities providing a wide range of undergraduate and graduate fields of study. Students are counted for each major awarded.


PLACEMENT AND OUTCOMES OF REGENTAL GRADUATES

Retaining our educated graduates in the South Dakota is crucial. This is why our universities collaborate with industry partners to create opportunities to connect and build relationships with students while they are on campus, whether through internships, externships, or experiential learning.

Most South Dakota resident students – over 73% – decide to live and work in the state after completing their post-secondary education. For nonresident students, 27% chose to make South Dakota their home last year, yielding more than 800 nonresident graduates who opted to stay in the state and fill essential positions.

Graduation records are checked for matches in the SDDL R Reemployment Assistance (RA) program for a one-quarter (three-month) window one year following a student's graduation date. Any employment/enrollment data returned for this time period – including part-time employment/enrollment – are included in the analysis. Although about 95 percent of South Dakota workers are covered by Reemployment Assistance's unemployment insurance, people who are employed by federal agencies, the self-employed and those employed in other states are excluded.

TEACHER EDUCATION

Teacher certification applicants in South Dakota must earn passing scores on exams for their certification area(s). Candidates applying for initial certification are required to meet qualifying scores on the appropriate Praxis II Subject Assessment(s) and Praxis II Principles of Learning and Teaching (PLT) test(s) that most closely correspond to their anticipated area(s) of instruction. **The system-wide cumulative pass rate was 91.9%.**

NOTE: SD employment percentages cited here refer only to the proportion of teacher education graduates who are hired by in-state school districts. These 'employment' rates do not include graduates who may have been hired by an out-of-state school district, hired by an educational organization other than a school district, hired outside the field of education, or entered graduate school.

TEACHER EDUCATION CANDIDATES: 1,162

Enrollment and degree attainment are both equally important.

Enrollment facilitates the pipeline of potential teacher candidates who receive a teaching credential.

This year there were a total of 1,162 teacher candidates, a 9% decrease over the 2023/254 academic year.

This chart represents all candidates and their respective majors. The five largest fields of study were elementary education, special education, early childhood education, music and physical education.



THE IMPACT OF A DEGREE



MASTER'S DEGREE IN GLOBAL AGRICULTURAL LEADERSHIP






GOVERNOR'S RESEARCH CENTER PROGRAM

In FY 2005 the state legislature began making an annual appropriation to fund state supported applied research centers designed to strengthen South Dakota's research competitiveness and generate commercial activity derived from research.

The Board of Regents along with the Research Excellence: A Critical Hallmark (REACH) Committee is charged with oversight and selection of the research centers. The program provides funding to research centers for 5-6 years to advance the following goals:

- Develop and license inventions; and












GENERAL FUND VS. STUDENT SUPPORT | FY21-FY25
